Community Stroke Rehabilitation Program	This is a southeast program that supports the provision of enhanced therapy services through Home & Community Care to individuals who have newly experienced a stroke. For persons living with the effects of stroke who are being transitioned to community, services could include occupational therapy, physiotherapy, speech language pathology and social work. Individuals transitioning to LTC are also eligible for these services except for physiotherapy which is provided by the LTC Home. Note that individuals who have spent an extended stay in hospital awaiting LTC placement following a stroke are still eligible for this program.
